The Early History of :- Grand Father William Binch and Grand Mother Binch

Filliam Binch and his wife arrived from Coversham in England in the year 1350 at the age of 29 years, and settled in St Albans. Where the first settlers arrived in 1850. The whole district was virgin bush through which maded tribes of Aborigines. The most important of these were the Booranghoop tribe, after which the district was named. The Blacks were evidently quite riendly as there were no record of any trouble

land boardering on Reedy Lake, which at that time was a large expansion of the water. This district became known as Hampstead. Others who settled there were:

Messrs Wood - Binch - Lowe - Scott - Deller - Moyses - Williams - Nairn - and Alcott.

another party arrived from England about the same time and settled further west

the name of St. Albans by Misses Drysdale and Newcomb, who owned considerable property between Drysdale and Boundary Road. It is worthy to note that a large proportion of these settlers were of the Wesleyian denomination, and as soon as they could they erected a small Chapel at the eastern end of the Lake land.

I small village had also sprung up further north, near Queenscliff Road, and this became known as East Geelong. Here also were some good Wesleyians, and the recorded services were held in a house in Regent Street in 1858.

Mr George Hunt and his wife Mary Hunt arrived from England in the year 1850 and settled in Moolap with their family of three daughter's and one son, Charlotte - Emma - Hester - and Fredrick Hunt who were all born in England. Later on Eliza - William - Sarah Ann Hunt were born at Moolap, Geelong.

When Grand Ma (Sarah Ann) was 10 years of age they went to New Zealand for two years. Returning to Geelong they rented a house in Pakington Street West Geelong, then known as Ashby. While they were there Grand Ma developed the Fever, and the Doctor prescribed medicine for her, but she could no keep the medicine down. So her mother tried giving her Wine, Grand Ma took to the Wine just like a duck taking to water. When the Doctor came again, he remarked "my word the medicine is doing her good Mrs Hunt" and the mother replied "No not the medicine but the Wine" Good said the doctor keep on pumping it into her. Leaving West Geelong Grand Ma's Mother and Father bought a farm at Connewarre

Aunt Charlotte married Mr William Bush and went to Strath-bogie in Gippsland They had three in their family :- Eliza - Alice - and Bill Bush.

Eliza married James Bell and lived in Wensleydale on a Dairy Farm J. Broughton and lived in Strath-bogie in Gippsland Alice Bill

Aunt Emma sent a letter back to her husband for some money, the letter was returned back to Geelong (Marked Un-known) Aunt Emma found out that he had sold out in Gippsland, and returned to his wife & family in England. (He being a Bigamist) Aunt Emma stayed on at Connewarre with her Son "George" and went back to work in Geelong. After a few years had passed, she met a Mr Heritage and were married and lived in Park Street, Newtown

Stan & Allan went with them to live but Norm stayed on with Grand Ma until he was 18 years of age. In May 1927 - Grand Ma - Uncle Ern - Norm and myself came to 195 Verner Street

LVIE WOMAN WHO KILLED HUSBAND DEEMED INSANE

Telbourne - Wednesday A Country housewife was found by a Criminal Court Jury to-day to have been legally insane when she stabbed to death on his bed ber husband with a sharp knife The husband, 42 year old carpenter, David William Binch of Alvie, near Colac died by the knife which he used to kill sheep

Was as leep in bed on the night of November 21st last year, when his wife loyee set upon him. Hrs Binch, mother of a boy aged 14 and a daughter aged 7 had a history of mental trouble, according to evidence during the short trial showed. Before the trial Mrs Binch was certified by Government Psychistriste as being then fit to stand trial and plead guilty or not guilty

However, other medical evidence at the trial showed she was legally insane at the time she was alleged to have killed her husband. On this basis Mr Justice Monahan directed the jury to acquit her of murder on the ground of insanity at the time. The jury did so, and the judge was obliged by law to commit her to an institution for the criminally insane until deemed fit by the authorities
